



## **Principal's Message**



This is some of what I see as I walk through classrooms at our fabulous school. At the end of each paragraph there is a word or phrase that captures the "big picture" of how and what children are learning. Read on and have a look inside classrooms...

In a fourth grade classroom, students are using iPads to explore fractions. The students click and drag their responses, they work with number lines to represent fractions, and they practice the Math facts using a feature called Fact Smart. (Technology)

A group of first grade children read "Little Red Riding Hood." After reading, the students are involved in building structures that can withstand the Big Bad Wolf

(a hair dryer). They are using Math and problem solving skills to build (engineer) a strong structure.

(STEM)

Third graders are working in groups. The teacher encourages the students to share what they know and want to learn about Martin Luther King. The groups are instructed to create a timeline of what they have learned about Martin Luther King.

#### (Collaboration)

Second grade students are using their Reading skills to understand information about their Health. They use an oximeter to get their oxygen level. Then they use their Math skills to construct a graph in order to chart oxygen levels of second graders.

#### (Integrated Learning)

In a pre-school class, students are using plastic bears to help them solve addition and subtraction problems.

(Hands on Learning)

Kindergarten children are parading around the school singing a song about standing up for others. A little boy sees me and immediately says, "Mrs. Rogers, look (as he pulls his lower lip down so far that it touched his chin) I lost two teef!" Now, everybody has their priorities and losing two teeth is pretty big stuff in the eyes of a 5 year old!



# 2014-2015 Pre-K and Kindergarten Registration

The goal of Pre-Kindergarten in the public schools is to provide learning experiences to help young children build their skills so they are more likely to do well in school. To be eligible for the Pre-Kindergarten program, children must be **four years old on or before September 1, 2014**. In addition, they also must be from families that are economically disadvantaged or homeless. All economically disadvantaged children who apply must be enrolled first; however, if there are spaces left, other children may be enrolled.

> Children who will be five years old on or before September 1, 2014 <u>must</u> register for Kindergarten.

### <u>Children who are currently attending Pre-Kindergarten at OCES must</u> <u>register for Kindergarten.</u>

If you have NOT called the school to schedule an appointment, please do so.

Kindergarten registration will occur on March 19<sup>th</sup> and 20<sup>th</sup>.

Pre-Kindergarten registration takes place on April 9<sup>th</sup> & 10<sup>th</sup>.

The following documents must be brought to the registration appointment:

- Birth Certificate (not a birth registration notice)
- Social Security Card
- Current Immunization Record
- Proof of Residency in the Ocean City Elementary School district (deed, lease, or utility bill that lists a service area in the OCES district)
- For PreK registration only: proof of income (2013 income tax return)
