Each child will sign up to compete in approximately 7 – 10 events and each class will have 10 participants per race. It is a great day for students to display teamwork and



good sportsmanship as they enjoy a day of fun and competition!

## Curriculum Connection

### ***Math: What does it look like in a second or third grade classroom?***

In a second grade classroom, students will extend their understanding of place value to the hundreds place. They will use this place value understanding to solve word problems, including those involving length and other units of measure. Students will continue to work on their addition and subtraction skills, quickly and accurately adding and subtracting numbers through 20 and also working with numbers up through 100. They will apply this skill to one and two-step word problems. They will also solve problems within 1000 by applying their understanding of models for addition and subtraction. Students also begin to build a foundation for understanding area and volume by working with shapes and geometry. They work on describing and analyzing shapes by examining their sides and angles. They investigate how decomposing and combining shapes to make other shapes. They also work on telling time and representing data in a bar graph.

You can help your second grader outside of school by playing math games. You can use a deck of cards for a math game. Deal two cards and have your child add the two cards together. You can also play the game, "I'm Thinking of a Number. It has 5 tens, 3 hundreds, and 4 ones. What is the number?" You can have your child explain the relationship between different numbers without counting. For example, 147 is 47 more than 100 and three less than 150. Have your child create story problems to represent addition and subtraction of numbers. Encourage your child to stick with it whenever a problem seems difficult. This will reinforce our school motto of having the courage to never give up.

In a third grade classroom, students will continue to build their concept of numbers, and developing an understanding of fractions as numbers. They will learn the concepts behind multiplication and division and apply problem-solving skills and strategies for multiplying and dividing numbers up through 100 to solve word problems. Students will also make connections between the concept of the area of a rectangle and multiplication and addition of whole numbers. Some activities include: multiplying one-digit numbers by multiples of 10 (such as 20, 30, 40), solve two-step word problems using addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division, relate the measurement of area to multiplication and division, identify a fraction as a number on a number line, and compare the size of two fractions.

You can help your third graders at home by playing math games with your child. For example, "I'm thinking of two numbers whose product is between 20 and 30. How many pairs can you think of that would satisfy this problem?" Encourage your child to write or describe numbers in different ways. For example, what are some different ways to make 1450?  $1450 = 1$  thousand, 4 hundreds, 5 tens, and 0 ones, or  $1000 + 450$ , 14 hundreds and 50 ones, 13 hundreds + 15 tens, etc. Use everyday objects to allow your child to explore the concept of fractions. For example, use measuring cups to have students demonstrate how many  $\frac{1}{3}$ 's are in a whole, and how many  $\frac{1}{4}$  cups are needed to make  $1\frac{1}{4}$  cups. Continue to encourage your child to stick with it whenever a problem seems difficult and praise your child and celebrate when they persevere.

As always, don't be afraid to reach out to your child's teacher. You have a very important role in your child's education.

# 2014-2015 Pre-K and Kindergarten Registration

To be eligible for the Pre-Kindergarten program, children must be **four years old on or before September 1, 2014**. Children who will be five years old on or before September 1, 2014 **must** register for Kindergarten.

Children who are currently attending Pre-Kindergarten at OCES **must** register for Kindergarten.

**If you have not registered your child for the 2014-2015 school year please call the school office today at 410-632-5370. If you have friends/family that have not registered, remind them to call the school as soon as possible.**

The following documents **must** be brought in when registering:

\*Birth Certificate (not a birth registration notice)

\*Social Security Card

\*Current Immunization Record

\*Proof of Residency in the Ocean City Elementary School district (deed, lease, or utility bill that lists a service area in the OCES district)

\*\*Additional For PreK registration: Proof of income (2013 income tax return)
